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## **EDITORIAL**

Progress! What is progress? One scholar, an old Headmaster, defines it with the words, "When we begin to spend more money on putting brains into people than blowing them out, that will be a sign of progress." This, we humbly submit, is also our opinion.

Not very long ago one of the School Societies came to the overwhelming conclusion that Pacifism is possible. There are those of the older generation who consider the three most obnoxious things on earth are American tourists, George Bernard Shaw, and Pacifism. But we of the younger generation are of a different school. No longer do we heed the rantings of old, worn-out politicians who condemn modern youth as being weak, slack, and self-indulgent.

Education has progressed, and with it the educated mind has progressed. War is no longer a glorious reality, but it is shown up as a very inglorious humbug. It is now nearly twenty years since the Great War ended. Every Armistice Day the memory grows dimmer, for the ranks of those who lived through the war are steadily decreasing. Perhaps, we suggest, they are held more dear for that

## "Extinctus Amabitur Idem."

But that is no cause for alarm. It is not Youth who wants war. In spite of the belligerent attitude of their leaders we believe the Youth of Germany, Italy and Russia, does not want war.

The Youth of to-day requires no A. A. Milne to spur him on. He does not think of war being undesirable and horrible, but he believes peace is essential. It is up to the older generation to see that this view-point is not destroyed.

We conclude, as did Mr. Baldwin, by endorsing his words, "I would conclude by just saying this to you: that if the world—Europe and the world—can find no other way of settling disputes than the way of war even now, when we are still finding and burying the bodies of those who fell twenty years ago, then the world deserves to perish."



They had told him the usual tale. Very sorry, no fault of their own, depression had caused them to cut down their staff. If he had been one of their latest employees, he might have understood, but fifteen years, and then a week's notice.

It was near Christmas, too, and he had planned such a fine time for his little family. Now, how was he to go home and break the news to them? His frame of mind turned from abject despondency to bitter cynicism. What an irony of fate, to discharge a valued servant because of a temporary period of bad trade. They did not think what it meant to a man to lose his job; they, with their chauffeurs and their mansions, they had power to control the happiness of lesser mortals.

He wondered why they had thought it necessary. Surely the pay of one minor employee could not affect them so much, as he had been in their service fifteen years, content to draw a wage sufficient for his modest needs. And yet, he thought, he had worked for fifteen years, and only yesterday had he read of fellows down in Wales who had been unemployed almost all their lives. Viewed in the light of their terrible lot his own seemed trifling. How it must prey on the mind of a man out of work for such a time.

There would be the dole or some such kind of assistance provided for him. He wondered what it would feel like queueing up to receive it; whether he would be able to face the ordeal of shame. There was no shame attached to his unemployment, nor yet to that of thousands more, yet people he knew were wont to look askance at an "out-of-work." Such was the stigma of unemployment.

When he reached home he managed, with pitiable effort, to tell them the tragedy. For tragedy it was that descended on that little household that night. Next morning he got a letter from his old firm, who wrote regretting their deplorable mistake. A new official, ignorant of his long and faithful service, had discharged him. The directors desired him to accept their most sincere apologies for such a lamentable error, and hoped that he would return to their employ as soon as possible.

In later life it seemed like a terrible nightmare to him; but one which left behind it a moral lesson. Never more did he disparage an "unemployed." The emotions through which he had passed brought home to him the stark terror of a workless outlook on life. He had experienced some little of the sufferings of a million men in England to-day, and was resolved never more to ignore appeals for aid and to do his share towards making men realise the shameful unnaturalness of unemployment in a land which might, if men could only go through the agony of mind he had, make an end for ever of this blight upon civilisation.
