SCHOOL NOTES

At the beginning of this term there were 640 boys on the school roll. The school will hear with regret that Mr. G. L. Cooper was unable to resume duty this term because of his illness. It is expected that he will be absent from duty for the whole of this school year, and we hope that he will be able to return in September, 1948.

Mr. W. B. Sneade, B.A., was appointed to the staff at the beginning of this term. He was educated at St. Francis Xavier's College, Liverpool, and at Liverpool University, and served in the Army for four years, attaining the rank of Major. He took his degree in General Studies, including English, History and French. At Liverpool University he was a prominent member of the Debating Society and was chosen to represent the University in Inter-Varsity debates; he was also a member of the Dramatic Society. We hope to derive great assistance from him in these two spheres of school activity.

This term, collections have been taken for the Mayor of Whitehaven Fund for the relief of suffering caused by the disaster at the William Pit, Whitehaven; the amount subscribed was £15 14s.

The amount collected for the Sale of Poppies was £11.

The school subscribed £10 towards the wedding gift for Princess Elizabeth.

On Thursday, September 25th, Squadron Leader Libby gave a talk to the senior boys on openings in the Royal Air Force. He spoke on the methods of entry either as Boy Apprentices, Aircraft Apprentices, or direct to the College at Cranwell.

On Friday, October 17th, Dr. Skemp, a lecturer in Classics at Man-

chester University, spoke to the Modern Sixth on Socrates.

The School Hall was loaned to the Southport Repertory Company on October 22nd and 23rd for evening performances of Noel Coward's play, "This Happy Breed." About 100 senior boys were allowed to attend and very much enjoyed the production.

A MARKET IN ISTANBUL

The war took many people away from their homes, but as I was not a Very Important Personage I had to wait until the end of the war before I could travel to Turkey. Once I got there, school and war-time restrictions became a far-away dream, and I was able to learn a great deal of life and conditions in a part of the world which will be of great importance in the future.

Now back in England, I can only afford to return to Turkey on paper, and as paper is also rationed, my journey must necessarily be limited, but, if you will come with me, we just have time to pay a visit to the Great Market in Istanbul, a scene typical of the East, yet also different from the usual Eastern bazaar.

We are now in a narrow cobbled street, partly covered over with vines, which leads to an enormous wooden door, now wide open, and passing through this we find ourselves inside the Great Market. It is like being in a tunnel which has stalls and shops built into its sides. The curved brick roof has arched openings which admit some light and air, and indeed, with all the colourful wares and bright lights leading into the gloom beyond, the whole place looks like a scene from the "Arabian Nights." This impression would be completed if the people were wearing old Turkish costume, but all the Turks we see are nowadays compelled to wear only European clothes. Looking at the wares on the stalls, we see that this is the best place to buy all goods of Turkish make rather than modern gadgets imported from England or America. For instance, we walk in "Slipper-makers' Street" and other streets named after the homely professions of the sellers who make their living in them.

Every now and then we have to step out of the way of porters carrying furniture, carpets and other bulky goods to the home of the purchaser. These men do not seem to be prevented from getting through the crowd by their heavy loads, for they use the extra weight to enable them to force a passage more easily. Once I bought some furniture from the market, and it was brought to my house by one man who carried on his back a couch, two easy chairs, and a large marble slab. While supporting this weight he balanced on one foot in order to remove his shoes before entering the house!

Ah, now we can see the cause of all the noise which fills the market. It is the travelling salesmen, who avoid shop-rent by carrying all their wares with them, and who give a hearty bellow from time to time in place of costly advertisement.

Now that that ice-cream seller has gone, we can take a closer look at the stalls; some are just recesses in the wall, but every shop is brightly lit, and many have well-arranged, colourful window-displays. The shop-fronts are often quite large, but when we look inside the shop we find that it is only a few feet wide. The shopkeeper himself usually sits on his doorstep drinking a tiny cup of Turkish coffee or reading a newspaper. If we seem interested in his goods-or sometimes even if we don't-he asks us inside and immediately offers a cigarette and asks us if we would prefer tea or coffee. Very often the proprietor of the shop is of Greek or Armenian descent, in which case he readily assures us that he is not a Turk and that if we come to his shop again we shall always find satisfaction. But the experts in the handling of foreigners are the curio and antique dealers. I was once making a small purchase when a man came up and to my amazement acted as mediator between myself and the shopkeeper. Speaking rather bad English, he endeavoured to end my transaction as quickly as possible, and then, having succeeded, asked me if I was interested in antiques, as he had a very good selection if I would just come this way. I said " No, thank you very much," but wherever I went he followed, always begging me to go with him to his wonderful shop. At last, though firmly denying any interest in anything, I was led to a lovely little antique shop, beautifully carpeted, and with a warm charcoal brazier burning. There a second man made me comfortable, ordered coffee, and then brought out old swords, costumes, jewellery and embroidery, until he had formed a large heap of things. Not only did I buy a few of the lovely articles he showed me, but I did much business with him later on. It was a great treat for me to receive such courteous service, for I had been used to war-time shopping in England.

This example shows how the Turk is accustomed to foreigners, and how many Turks speak several languages, and are quite unselfconscious although they may speak very badly. It is this attitude, coupled with his natural courtesy and interest in other people, that makes the Turk more "internationally-minded" than many Englishmen, and perhaps this brief glimpse into a part of the life of another nation will make you and me a little more interested in the problems of other people, and hence more interested in the settlement of world affairs.
