


# SCHOOL NOTES



## MR. CHARLES THOMPSON

Even amid the violent upheavals of our times we are still so subject to custom and routine that, forgetting that change is the essential principle of life, we are apt to imagine that the things and the people we know will continue the same for ever. Especially is this so when a man remains as hale and hearty as did Mr. J. C. Thompson, whom everybody knew as just Charles Thompson, almost to the very end, for although he had well exceeded the span allotted by the Psalmist the rest was by no means labour and sorrow, but he retained such vigour of mind and body and such thorough enjoyment of life that it was hardly possible to believe the calendar. But the inevitable hour has struck and, recovering from the shock of its suddenness, we realise the loss our little community has suffered by the passing of so vivid a personality.

In the distant days of September, 1920, when the School opened at the Woodlands, that ramshackle old place still dear to the memory of those who suffered its rigours, Mr. Thompson was at the piano, and rare indeed were the occasions after that when he was not at the post of duty. He was devoted to the School and to his work and always ready to help those who were keen: many a past and present Georgian knows the kindness and warm-hearted friendliness which underlay a manner some may have found a little brusque and forbidding, and could tell of the sympathetic encouragement given to his musical activities. Out of school hours, Mr. Thompson gave up much time to training and conducting the School Orchestra, whether they were making music for fun or in serious preparation for a concert or a play. Besides holding the Silver Medal of the Royal Academy of Music, of which he was an Associate, for Singing, he had also gained the Bronze Medal for Elocution, and from the inception of the School Elocution Contests he enthusiastically placed his knowledge and skill at our disposal, and the competitors learned much from his patient analysis and helpful comments as senior judge.

On the sports field Mr. Thompson was a familiar figure. In early days he had been an accomplished swimmer, and until quite recently the skill of his strong right arm was known on the local tennis courts. But his interest extended to all forms of sport, and whenever time permitted he was present in all weather on the touch line or the boundary to encourage the rising generation.

It is not for us here to speak of his life outside the School, but those who knew him well know how wide and varied were his interests, and how keenly he pursued them all. Now the symphony is over: no doubt at times it had its jars and perplexed counterpoints, but what musician would look for or desire a vapid unbroken succession of concords? Enough that each slightest dissonance has found its resolution in the solemn final chord. The everlasting pause begins, and in the silence of the heart those who are left can hear the echoes of many a sweet and fragrant passage.
