The Further and Higher Education Act of which I spoke last year has taken up much of our time this year. The College will be independent of the LEA from 1st April. Of course this brings us fantastic opportunities to spread our wings - but the climate of the new culture and complex funding mechanisms in the world of FE is worrying. The rules are designed to cover over 400 Colleges nation-wide and the diversity in the sector is very great. We have worked hard to ensure our voice is heard and will continue to keep the quality of education we give our students at the forefront of our mission. The publication of exam results nation-wide showed KGV to be in the top five sixth form colleges in the country. We will work very hard to stay there.

The pressure from the new Further Education Funding Council is to expand. Targets of 8% growth with 5% funding and 3% efficiency gain are standard. How very fortunate I am to have such a talented group of Governors, three of whom are Old Georgians. Their financial expertise and business acumen are invaluable. We have had to submit detailed plans and costings. Ideally we would like to put up some new buildings, but budgets are tight.

We are planning a major Friends of the College initiative to encourage people to use their talents and interests to support curriculum areas of the College and attend College events. We will also try to raise money for major new projects such as a technology centre and lecture theatres named after those who offer their support.

All of the extra pressures this year have taken up much time, but the best hours of the week are those when I am able to teach a class or take a year meeting. The students are the centre of the College, the raison d'etre - as you were then - so they are now. They deserve the best. The Governors, the staff and I are determined that they shall get it."

Night School

The editor invited Mr.Geoffrey Dixon, former Headmaster of King George Fifth Grammar School, to contribute an article to this years Red Rose. The editor would like to thank Mr.Dixon for his response and the following memory from the 1960's.

"I forget the year, but it was the early 1960's. As seems to be perpetually the case, the Government was in trouble. To save fuel it had been decreed that 'summer time' would last the whole year through. As a result school started while it was still completely dark in those January days. To compound our difficulties the electricians at the power stations were on strike. There was a scheme in force by which each area of the town had its electricity cut off for a few hours each day. For the first few days of the strike all went well because our electricity was only cut off in the afternoons. But the day came when we were told it would not be turned on until 11 a.m. in the morning. One of my many weaknesses is that I hate being pushed around. Short of an earthquake, no school should be shut. So I took the decision to open as usual at 8.50 that morning.

When I reached school that morning my heart began to fail. There was no moon. It was overcast and completely dark. But there was no turning back now. I asked the Prefects to direct everyone to the assembly hall when they arrived and at 8.50 promptly I stepped on to the platform. It was a weird sensation. We might have been at the bottom of a mine it was so dark. I could not see anything at all even of the front row. I had no torch, indeed it would have been a mistake to use one. To have flashed it around would have been to encourage fooling about. As it was there was none. There could have been riots, cat calls, rotten eggs and all manners of foolery. Resisting the temptation to call for the hymn 'Lead Kindly Light', I asked the school to go to their rooms for the first period and the staff would give them aural work until it was light enough to see. The school filed out of the hall in almost complete silence and lessons started promptly. As far as I remember there were no more than the usual number of absentees that day.

I received not a single complaint about this outrageous affair from any boy nor from any parent. The only difficulty I had to deal with was an attempted revolt in the Staff Room. A few members thought it would have been a good idea to have a morning off work. This was brought up at a staff room meeting, but the Deputy Head, Joe Edwards, than whom no more loyal colleague existed, had quelled the revolt before I even arrived at the meeting, so we had no further trouble.

I do not know whether I would have had the face to do this again but, fortunately, I was not put to the test because the electricians gave in before I did! There were many occasions during my 27 years when I felt very proud of the boys at KGV, but never more so than on that cold January morning so many years ago when we had 'Night School'."

Alan Bason (d. 20 September 1991)

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EARLY GEORGIANS, PART TWO by S.B.Rimmer.

Following on from last years' extract from the K.G.V. scouts notebook from the 1920's, Stan Rimmer has offered this poem written by P.H.Woodham, recalling the Summer Camp of 1929 at Nibthwaite.

The Lions Den

We raised the tent right up at last, Against its weight we fought, Until we saw the pole, alas! 'Twas quite six inches short!

So we went foraging afar, And different stones we found, Which we put underneath the pole, To raise it off the ground.
