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CAPT. RALPH THOMSON

Capt, Ralph J. Thomson, who died at his home in South-port on Wednesday, 27th November, was one of the few remaining members of the staff of the Southport Boys' Secondary at the Woodlands. He was appointed in 1924 and he remained on the staff of King George V School until his retirement in 1954. He was Housemaster of Leech's house from 1930 to 1952, and Head of the Modern Languages department from 1950.

Born in 1889, he was a graduate of the universities of London and Grenoble, and had earlier teaching experience at Kingswood School, Bath. He served in France during the first World War, losing his left arm, and in 1939 he returned to the Army, serving as an Intelligence officer throughout the war years.

He was the author of several books written under the pen-name "Raoul", including a book of travels in the Black Forest, "Two's Company", and a novel, "Fortune Spins Auburn".

Capt. Thomson will be remembered with affection as a man of kindly and lively personality by many generations of King George V School boys and by friends in various spheres outside the school.

MR. H. SMITH

With Mr. Smith's retirement this term the school loses one of its most senior members of staff. He was trained at Loughborough College, and after early teaching experience and service during the war as a Flight-Sergeant staff instructor in the Royal Air Force School of Physical Training he was appointed to take charge of Physical Education at King George V School in April, 1947. He held this post for ten years and was then seconded for a year to attend a mathematics course at Didsbury College of Education. He returned as a member of the Mathematics department in September, 1958, and he became Mason's housemaster in 1966.

Once they had seen beneath his outwardly stern exterior, newly qualified teachers soon knew where to turn when problems arose about work or pupils; he always had time, and would willingly spend it passing on valuable advice based on his long experience. He gave help and enthusiastic support to any new developments in the Mathematics department. He adapted to the so-called "modern" mathematics, at the same time retaining th traditional virtues of accuracy, neatness, explanation and frequent practice of examples to hammer home the important points. His insistence on standards — in work, behaviour and appearance — has never wavered, and the majority of boys who have known him over the years appreciate him just as much as his colleagues do.

Throughout his career Mr. Smith has taken a great interest in Rugby football, and many players have profited from his vigorous and expert coaching while they were at school. He played for Waterloo Rugby Club for twelve seasons and in his last season was Vice-Captain under the England captain, Jack Heaton. He organised schools' Rugby at Waterloo and was a referee in the Liverpool and District Referees Society for nine years, taking several county championship games in his capacity as senior referee. He also assisted in Athletics coaching at school and introduced house competitions for junior and senior trophies in Gymnastics and Boxing. For some years he organised a school Boxing Club.

Mr. Smith will be missed, especially by the boys in Mason's house, who will remember him for his sympathetic understanding as well as for his firmly maintained standards, and by those whom he taught. We wish him well in his retirement and hope he will often return to visit us.


This number of five awards equals the best previous performances by the school at Oxford and Cambridge. In two previous years, 1955 and 1969, we also won five awards.
